

## POSITION DESCRIPTION

**Title of Position:** Executive Officer – Sustainable Winegrowing Australia

**Reporting to:** Sustainable Winegrowing Australia Advisory Board (program strategy and delivery oversight)  
General Manager – Engagement and Sustainability (line manager)

**Overview:**  
The Executive Officer – leads and manages the Sustainable Winegrowing Australia program.

**Qualifications:**  
Preferred tertiary qualifications in Viticulture/Oenology, Environmental/Sustainability Policy and/or Management, with postgraduate qualifications well regarded.

**Experience:**  
The Executive Officer will bring senior-level experience appropriate to leading a national, multi stakeholder sustainability program operating within a complex governance environment. This is a hands-on leadership role requiring both strategic capability and operational delivery.

Essential experience includes:

- Senior leadership experience in a grape and wine sector, sustainability, or member-based organisations;
- Demonstrated experience operating within, and reporting to, a Board and working effectively with a Chair;
- Developing and delivering strategic and annual operating plans;
- Proven capability in financial management, budgeting and reporting;
- Managing programs or initiatives that involve assurance, certification, data and compliance frameworks;
- Engaging with, and balancing competing demands of diverse stakeholders across industry, government, and service providers;
- Delivering programs through influencing and leading virtual teams and working groups;
- Operating in a complex governance or partnership environment.

Desirable experience includes:

- Management in the grape and wine sector, broader agriculture, food, or natural resource management;
- Experienced in working with and developing ESG frameworks, sustainability reporting, certification or assurance systems;
- Supporting market access, trade or customer-driven sustainability requirements;
- Managing service providers or delivery partners.

### Principal accountabilities

The Executive Officer is responsible for the day-to-day leadership and management of the Sustainable Winegrowing Australia program, delivering the Board-approved strategy and Annual Operating Plan (AOP), and supporting the Board and Sustainable Winegrowing

Oversight Resourcing Direction (SWORD) in fulfilling their governance and oversight responsibilities.

**Key accountabilities:**

**Program leadership and delivery**

- Lead the development and implementation of the Sustainable Winegrowing Australia Strategic Plan and annual operating plans (AOPs); and clarify program priorities, in collaboration with the Sustainable Winegrowing Australia Advisory Board;
- Ensure the program remains fit for purpose, credible and responsive to sector and market needs;
- Drive continuous improvement of the program, including usability, cost effectiveness and member value;
- Position the Australian grape and wine sector as leading globally in sustainability practices.
- Monitor global sustainability trends, and approaches to industry standards and tools so that Sustainable Winegrowing Australia delivers sustainability impact, and remains internationally competitive;
- Ensure member services, tools and support are delivered to a high standard.

**Governance support and reporting**

- Support the Independent Chair and Advisory Board to enable effective governance and high-quality decision-making;
- Prepare timely, accurate and relevant reports for the Board and SWORD, including performance, risks and emerging issues;
- Implement Board and SWORD decisions and recommendations;
- Maintain appropriate program policies, procedures and delegations consistent with governance requirements within the AWRI operational environment.

**Financial management and risk**

- Manage the program budget in accordance with SWORD-approved allocations;
- Monitor financial performance and ensure accurate and transparent reporting;
- Maintain and manage the program risk register and ensure mitigation strategies are implemented;
- Ensure appropriate internal controls, contracts and compliance arrangements are in place, and a willingness to work with internal audit with a spirit of constructive improvement.

**Certification, data and trust mark management**

- Oversee the effective operation of certification, assurance and audit arrangements;
- Ensure data governance policies, systems and processes are implemented and maintained;
- Manage trust mark administration in accordance with approved rules of use, and manage certification quality and address non-compliance issues;
- Identify and escalate any material compliance or reputational issues to the Chair.

**Stakeholder engagement and representation**

- Build and maintain strong, collaborative relationships with Australian Grape and Wine Inc., AWRI, Wine Australia and other key stakeholders;
- Engage with members, industry bodies, government agencies and service providers – with the particular aim to increase and retain program membership;
- Manage effective relationships with third-party auditors
- Represent Sustainable Winegrowing Australia at sector forums, advisory committees and events as required;
- Support the delivery of educational programs/resources to support member adoption, and collective sustainability impact;
- Support stakeholder confidence in the integrity, credibility and value of the program;
- Lead the preparation of an annual impact report demonstrating program outcomes, and sharing member stories of progress and lessons learnt.

**People, providers and capability**

- Coordinate and manage other AWRI staff and contractors supporting the program;
- Manage relationships with delivery partners, service providers and suppliers;

- Foster a professional, inclusive and high-performing culture;
- Ensure appropriate capability development, succession planning and continuity of operations.

### **Person specification**

The successful candidate will demonstrate the following attributes and capabilities:

#### **Leadership and judgement**

- Strong strategic leadership combined with practical delivery capability;
- Sound judgement and the ability to operate effectively in a complex and sometimes ambiguous environment;
- High levels of integrity, professionalism and accountability.

#### **Governance and stakeholder capability**

- Strong understanding of governance principles and the respective roles of Boards and management;
- Ability to work constructively with a Chair, Board and SWORD oversight bodies;
- Excellent stakeholder engagement, influencing and written and verbal communication skills.

#### **Commercial and operational acumen**

- Strong business acumen and financial literacy;
- Ability to manage competing priorities and deliver outcomes within agreed resources;
- Experience establishing and maintaining effective systems, processes and controls.

#### **Sector and sustainability orientation**

- Commitment to sustainability and continuous improvement;
- Drive to lead industry transformation programs;
- Ability to understand and respond to evolving ESG expectations and market requirements;
- Capacity to translate complex technical or sustainability concepts into practical, accessible guidance for industry.

#### **Personal attributes**

- Collaborative, respectful and solutions-focused approach;
- Resilient, adaptable and comfortable sitting with ambiguity while working in a high-accountability role;
- Capacity to influence and engage nationally and represent the program with credibility and energy.

#### **Workplace Health and Safety Responsibilities:**
